Nothing beats a beautiful set of cloth napkins whether you're making a set for yourself or to give as a gift! Euclid cloth napkins are a super easy project that can be whipped up quickly. The fringed edge can highlight the great texture and colors of the fabric, while the blank-canvas nature of the project lends itself to plenty of exploration in embellishment.

Pattern Level: Confident Beginner

Fabric and Supplies Needed

Fabric amounts based on yardage that is 42" wide.

Notes Before You Begin

- Read through all of the instructions before beginning.
- All of the seam allowances are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.
- Press seam allowances open unless otherwise noted.
- Width of fabric (WOF) is equal to at least 42" wide.
- Right sides together has been abbreviated to RST.
- Remember to measure twice and cut once!

Instructions

Step 1: Cut four 16" x 16" squares.

Step 2: From each side, pull fabric threads to create frayed edges. Tip: Use a seam ripper (optional) to get the first few strands started. Then pull a few threads from each side, working your way around all edges.

Step 3: Continue pulling threads until frayed strands measure 1/4" to 3/8" in length. Using 2.0mm stitch, sew around napkin edges just inside frayed edge. Note: Either match your thread or go for contrast. Your stitching can be decorative or neutral.

Optional Embellishment: Use embroidery and cross-stitch techniques to personalize your napkins. I made use of the fabric grid to create my own design with embroidery floss. You could also create your own motif or add your initials for a great monogram!
