Notes Before You Begin

- Please read through all of the instructions before beginning.
- All of the seam allowances are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.
- Press seam allowances open unless otherwise noted.
- Width of fabric (WOF) is equal to at least 42" wide.
- Remember to measure twice and cut once!

Printing the Templates: Use 8-1/2" x 14" paper

- Print forty-six copies of Template A (page 7) at 100%
- Print fifty-four copies of Template B (page 8) at 100%

Tips For Accurate Paper-Piecing

- You may print the templates on plain copy paper, or use a specialty foundation paper such as Carol Doak's Foundation Paper.
- Place your fabric on the UNPRINTED side of the foundation template and sew on the printed side.
- You can transfer lines to the unprinted side of your paper by using a tracing wheel, or by folding and creasing the paper.
- Use a short stitch length (about a 1.5).
- Backstitch in the seam allowance at the beginning and end of each seam.
- Trim seam allowance to 1/4" after sewing each seam and press flat with a dry iron. This will keep your seams crisp and your templates flat.

Cutting Instructions

Fabric A

- Cut one strip 8" x WOF, then subcut
 - Six rectangles 4" x 8".
 - From the remaining strip cut six rectangles 3" x 7".

Fabric B

- Cut one strip 7" x WOF, then subcut twelve rectangles 3" x 7".
- Cut two strips 8" x WOF, then subcut twelve rectangles 4" x 8".

Fabric C

- Cut six strips 8" x WOF, then subcut seventy-two rectangles 3-1/2" x 8".

Fabric D

- Cut 18 strips 10-1/2" x WOF, then subcut:
 - Seventy-two rectangles 5-1/2" x 10-1/2"
 - One hundred-eight rectangles 3" x 10-1/2"
- Cut four strips 6-1/2" x WOF, then subcut 45° angles, as pictured, to make Inset Triangles and Corners.



Fabric E


- Cut three strips 8" x WOF, then subcut twenty-eight rectangles 4" x 8".
- Cut three strips 7" x WOF, then subcut thirty-six rectangles 3" x 7".

Fabric F


- Cut three strips 8" x WOF, then subcut thirty-six rectangles 3-1/2" x 8".


Assembly Instructions

Step 1: Paper-Piece and Assemble the Blocks




- 1. Using Template A, place a Fabric D 5-1/2" x 10-1/2" rectangle right side up on the **UNPRINTED** side of the template. The fabric will be entirely covering section 1 and there will be at least 1/4" of extra fabric all around the section.
- 2. Place a Fabric A 4" x 8" rectangle right side down so that it is 1/4" over the line between section 1 and section 2. Be sure to position the fabric so that it will entirely cover section 2 once sewn.







- 3. Sew along the line between section 1 and 2 using a small stitch. You will sew about 1/4" or so past the beginning and end of the line, and backstitch.


 Trim the seam allowances to 1/4".
- 4. Flip fabric so it covers section 2 and press flat using a dry iron.





- 5. Place a Fabric D 5-1/2" x 10-1/2" rectangle right side down, so that it is 1/4" over the line between section 2 and 3.
- 6. Sew along the line between section 2 and 3 and then trim the seam allowances to 1/4". Flip fabric so it covers section 3 and press with a dry iron.





- 7. Your template will now look something like the image to the left.
- 8. Trim fabric along the seam allowance and gently remove the paper from the back.



9. Repeat steps 1-8 to make a second identical triangle. Piece the two triangles together as pictured. The seams will nest together when they are matched up.



Repeat steps 1-9 to make the following blocks: (Template B is paper-pieced the same way as Template A, but there are two extra sections.)




Block 1: Template A

Make 3 blocks (6 templates)
Two Fabric D 5-1/2" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
One Fabric A 4" x 8" rectangle per template




Block 2: Template A

Make 14 blocks (28 templates)
Two Fabric D 5-1/2" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
One Fabric E 4" x 8" rectangle per template




Block 3: Template A

Make 6 blocks (12 templates)
Two Fabric D 5-1/2" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
One Fabric B 4" x 8" rectangle per template




Block 4: Template B

Make 3 blocks (6 templates)
Two Fabric D 3" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
Two Fabric F 3-1/2" x 8" rectangles per template
One Fabric A 3" x 7" rectangle per template



Block 5: Template B

Make 18 blocks (36 templates)
Two Fabric D 3" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
Two Fabric C 3-1/2" x 8" rectangles per template
One Fabric E 3" x 7" rectangle per template




Block 6: Template B

Make 6 blocks (12 templates)
Two Fabric D 3" x 10-1/2" rectangles per template
Two Fabric F 3-1/2" x 8" rectangles per template
One Fabric B 3" x 7" rectangle per template

Step 2: Assemble the Quilt

- Sew the blocks into diagonal rows, as pictured. Each diagonal row will begin and end with a Fabric D Inset Triangle, or Corner.
- Sew the rows together, matching the seams.



Your quilt top is complete! Baste, quilt, bind and enjoy.
