


Fabric amounts based on yardage that is 42" wide.

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Notes Before You Begin

- Read through all of the instructions before beginning.
- All of the seam allowances are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.
- Press seam allowances open unless otherwise noted.
- Width of fabric (WOF) is equal to at least 42" wide.
- Right sides together has been abbreviated to RST.
- Remember to measure twice and cut once!

From Fabric A, cut:

three 4-1/2" x WOF strips. Subcut:

twenty 4-1/2" squares for the block centers

twelve 3" x WOF strips. Subcut:

one hundred sixty 3" squares for the HSTs

twelve 2-7/8" x WOF strips. Subcut:

one hundred sixty 2-7/8" squares for the Flying Geese

From each of Fabrics B and I, cut:

one 5-1/4" x WOF strip. Subcut:

two 5-1/4" squares for the Flying Geese

From each of Fabrics C and H, cut:

one 5-1/4" x WOF strip. Subcut:

four 5-1/4" squares for the Flying Geese

From each of Fabrics D and G, cut:

one 5-1/4" x WOF strip. Subcut:

six 5-1/4" squares for the Flying Geese

From each of Fabrics E and F, cut:

one 5-1/4" x WOF strip. Subcut:

eight 5-1/4" squares for the Flying Geese

From Fabric J, cut:

three 3" x WOF strips. Subcut:

forty 3" squares for the HSTs

From Fabric K, cut:

nine 3" x WOF strips. Subcut:

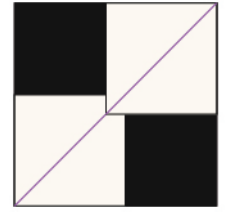
one hundred twenty 3" squares for the HSTs

From the Binding Fabric, cut:

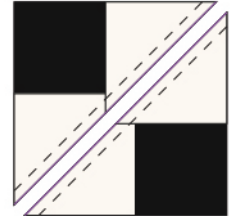
six 2-1/2" x WOF strips

Assemble the Flying Geese

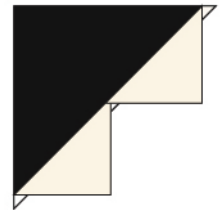
Step 1: Pin two 2-7/8" Fabric A squares in opposing corners of a 5-1/4" Fabric B square, RST. The squares will overlap slightly in the center of the large square. Using a ruler, draw a diagonal line through the squares.



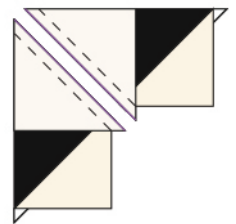
Step 2: Sew scant 1/4" seam on each side of the diagonal line. Set the seam by pressing it flat. Cut along the diagonal line, creating two identical units.



Step 3: Press the fabric toward smaller triangles. Repeat with the second unit.



Step 4: Place one 2-7/8" Fabric A square at the corner of sewn block unit. Draw diagonal line in pencil. Sew a scant 1/4" seam on each side of diagonal line. Set seam (press). Cut along diagonal line, creating two identical units.



Step 5: Press the seam toward smaller triangle. Trim off small dog ears left by the seam allowance. Trim to 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" if necessary. Repeat to make four flying geese blocks.



Step 6: Repeat with all remaining 5-1/4" Fabric B-I squares and 2-7/8" Fabric A squares to make a total of:

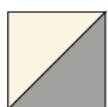

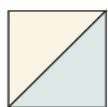

Assemble the Half-Square Triangles (HSTs)

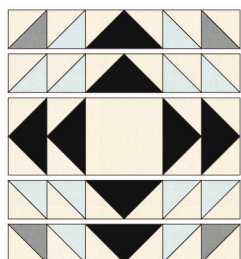


Step 7: Pair a 3" Fabric A square with a 3" Fabric J square, RST. Mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of one square. Sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " away from both sides of the marked line. Cut on the marked line, creating two half-square triangles (HSTs). Press toward the darker fabric. Trim to $2\frac{1}{2}$ " square. Repeat to make eighty A/J HSTs.



Step 8: Repeat Step 7 to make two hundred forty A/K HSTs.

Assemble the Blocks



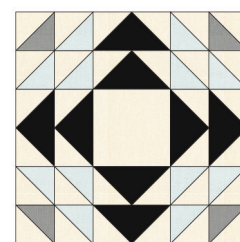
Step 9: Gather:
four A/J HSTs
twelve A/K HSTs
eight Fabric B Flying Geese
one $4\frac{1}{2}$ " Fabric A square

Arrange the units into five rows of five. Note the fabric placement and block orientation in the Block Assembly Diagram.

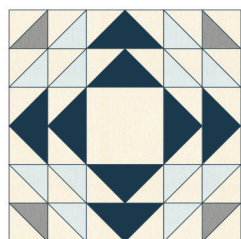
Step 10: Sew the squares together to form the rows. Press the seams in opposite directions every other row.

Step 11: Sew the rows together, nesting the seams and pressing the seams to one side to form the block.

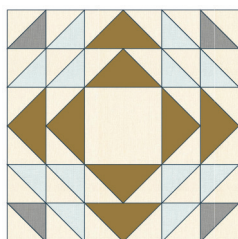
The resulting B Block should measure $12\frac{1}{2}$ " square.



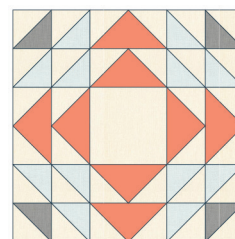
Step 12: Repeat Steps 9-11 to make:



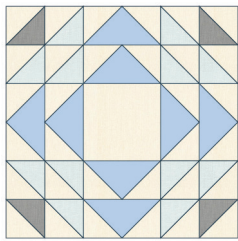
two Fabric C Blocks



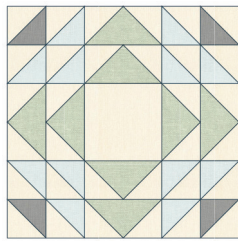

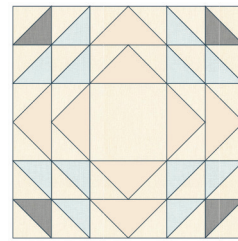

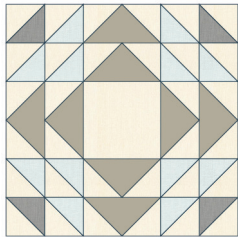

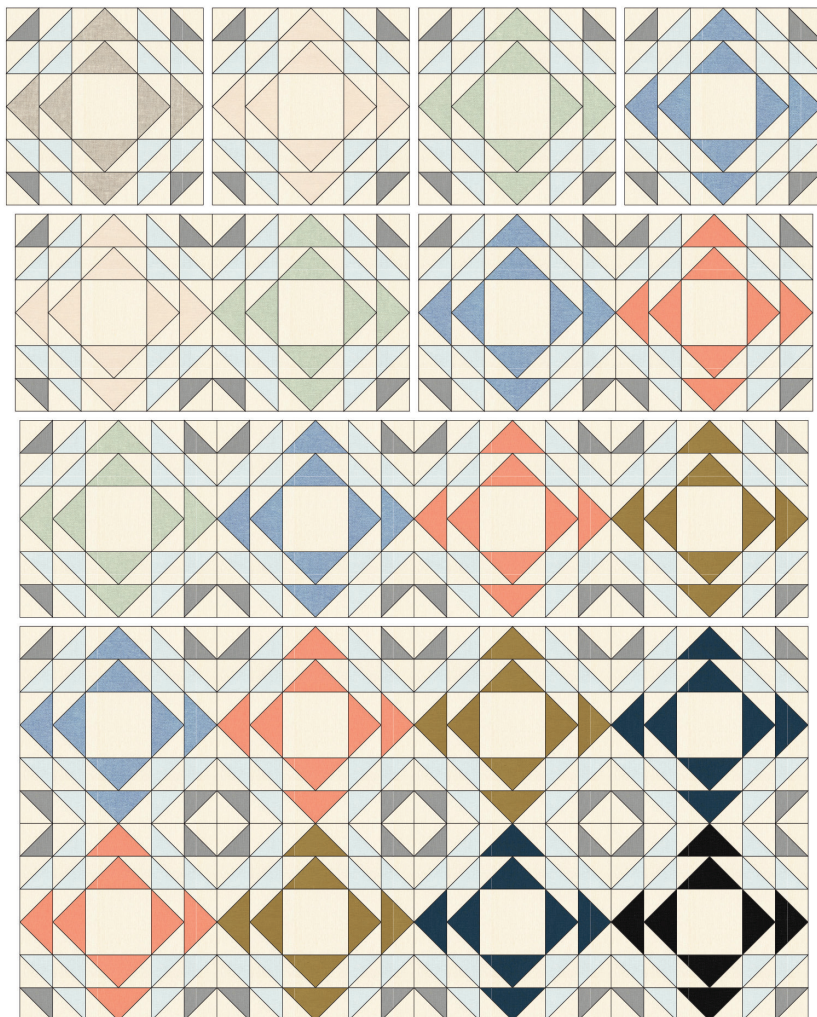

Assemble the Quilt



Step 13: Arrange the blocks into five rows of four blocks. Note the fabric placement and block orientation in the Quilt Assembly Diagram.

Step 14: Sew the blocks together to form rows. Press the rows to the left in the odd numbered rows and to the right in the even numbered rows.

Step 15: Sew the rows together to form the quilt center. Press the row seams open.

Your quilt top is complete! Baste, quilt, bind and enjoy!
